

Interesting that Khaki back then was a lot more green then what we call khaki today.

The doesn't text actually indicate what type of fabric is used, but I would guess cotton.

Per the text, the suits were available in all these colors plus white, while the frock was available only in the solid colors. And it only cost 50¢ extra to add your message to the back of these garments.



Suits—Extra well made. Big and roomy; no binding at crotch or arm pits. Seven large pockets. Button flap breast pocket with watch and pencil pocket combination. Side pocket for pliers or ruler. Reinforced triple stitched seams. Strain points have rip-proof bar tacks. Front of suit button closing. Furnished in Khaki, Blue, Hickory, Khaki and Blue, and White. (See illustrations.)

A popular style of the Model A era were pendants with a matching ring. Here is a page showing a few of these from a 1931 Chas. L. Trout wholesale jewelry catalog I recently acquired.

The pieces on this page are all of gold and gemstones including diamonds accents. The chains are all 14k or 18k white gold, 16 inches in length. This appears to not include the length of the drop pendant. Some of the chains and settings are decorated with green and red gold.

The stones in these sets are sapphires, aquamarines, amethysts, "genuine sun ray crystals", "emeraldas", and "zirctones". These last two are not a misspelling! The only genuine stones are the aquamarines and amethysts and also the diamonds. The others are "Heller Hope" stones.

According to an internet search (http://eragem.com/news/category/engagement-ring-news/antique-engagement-rings/) L. Heller & Son were leading manufacturers of synthetic stones as early as 1890 with created pearls and rubies. By 1909 they were making sapphires too. But the "emeraldas" is most likely green glass as synthetic emeralds didn't make an appearance until 1935.

Synthetic stones were extremely popular in the 20's and 30's, and used with real gold and diamonds or even platinum. But they still hold their value today due to the quality that went into making them and the settings that they were used in.

Brands We Still Know

Rice Krispies were first sold by Kellogg's in It wasn't until 1928. 1929 that the words "Snap, Crackle, Pop" was used in advertising to describe the now famous sound the cereal makes. These words weren't added to the box until 1932. Although we now know the 3 Rice Krispies elves by those names, originally only Snap was put the box in 1933. Crackle and Pop were used in advertising starting in 1933 but weren't added to the box until 1941 The only

time in advertising the elves didn't use these words was during WWII when they did public service ads telling people to "Save time, save fuel, save energy."

Interesting note: In Australia, they are called Rice Bubbles.

Henry Ford's Accident

Malcolm McIntyre



Did you know that a competing auto maker almost kept Henry from seeing the Model A? That would be the type of headline one might see today on some internet news site but here's what really happened. The headline of the April 1, 1927 issue of The Augusta Herald announced that **HENRY FORD TAKEN BACK HOME**.

The article started with the still large print **Body Splinted**, **Magnate Lies Flat on Back**. "Behind the carefully guarded portals of his great estate at Dearborn, Henry Ford, reputed the world's richest man, flat on his back in bed Friday began a long period of absolute rest which his doctors said would fully restore his health. Chafing at the restraint of treatment in his own great hospital, Mr. Ford tenderly was returned to his home Thursday night, a ten mile ambulance ride. "

The hospital mentioned was the Henry Ford Hospital in Detroit. Established in 1915 this facility now contains 802 beds. Dr. R. D. McClure the chief surgeon of the hospital at the time was summoned to care for Henry and he remained under his supervision until his discharge.

So was happened? Henry was driving south on Michigan Ave Sunday March 27th about 8:30 pm alone in a his "little coupe" As he emerged from the driveway of the Ford Laboratories in Dearborn a larger car, reportedly a Studebaker, coming from behind forced him off the road, down an embankment and into a tree. Henry was 64 at the time and suffered a concussion, brief unconsciousness and slight hemorrhage of the bladder and lungs. The car that hit him sped away from the scene and speculation at the time was that it was an assassination attempt.

This was speculation that Henry quickly squashed as untrue. Only the garage man and Mrs. Ford knew that Henry had gone back to his offices. It was stated that Henry's custom of going out alone at all hours caused concern to his friends but that no amount of council has availed to change it. Henry would recover such that he and Edsel would make history and drive the 15 millionth Model T off the assembly line on May 26, 1927.

Tech Article-STOPLIGHT SWITCH SHORTS

John Osborn shared a good article with me a about stoplight switch shorts, from the winter 2006 Model A Times. I thought it would be a good idea to pass an excerpt along.

The Model A Times has received several re-ports of electrical shorts in the stoplight switch. One of our readers sent us his switch so that we could identify the problem. After removing the cover, it was clear that the switch contact had worn through the rod's fiber washer sufficiently enough to make contact with the metal washer on the front side of the fiber washer, causing an electrical short. See photo below.



We located four different configurations of the stoplight switch. All of the stoplight switches are apparently made in Taiwan, and there are four different manufactures in Taiwan making these switches. At this time all but one of the manufactured switches has a potential shorting problem.

THE POTENTIAL PROBLEM Operation of the switch contacts is dependent on the fiber washer attached to the center rod. As the spring loaded fiber washer is pushed forward, it pushes against the brass switch contact, causing it to push the upper contact against the lower switch contact, closing the switch circuit. When the switch is closed, there is 6 volts DC on the brass switch contacts. The problem of developing an electrical short occurs when the metal washer in front of the fiber washer is close to the same size as the fiber washer. When the fiber washer wears from contact with the upper brass switch contact, it allows the brass switch contact to short circuit against the metal washer.

Of the four manufactured stoplight switches, only one at this time is manufactured in such a way that it is unlikely that a short would occur. The other three have a high possibility of shorting with extended use and minimal wear on the fiber washer.




Figure 1 - Best Made Switch

From an outward appearance, all four of the stoplight switches appear to be the same, with the exception of the insulator block that the two screws for the

harness wires attach. Each of the four stoplight switches has a different colored insulator block for the harness screws. The recommended switch, with the least possibility of shorting, has a RED insulator block for the harness screws. Internally, this switch has a large RED fiber washer, measuring .600" diameter. It has a very thin metal washer in the center of the fiber washer that measures .440" diameter. This leaves over 1/8" clearance between the fiber washer and the thin metal washer in the center. Two of these switches (with RED insulator block) were found on Model A's that were re-stored in the mid 1980's. It is unknown where the switches were purchased. See Figure 1.




Figure 2 - Shorting Occurred

This next switch can be identified by the BROWN insulator block for the harness screws. Internally, this switch has a brown fiber washer, measuring .535" diameter. It has a thick metal washer and a snap ring in front of the fiber washer that measures .475" diameter. This leaves about 1/32" clearance between the fiber washer and the thick steel washer and snap ring. Extended use and wear on the fiber washer has caused the upper switch-contact to short against the steel washer and snap ring. This is the switch found shorted, shown on the previous page. See Figure 2.

The third switch is identified by the YELLOW insulator block for the harness screws. Internally, this switch has a small WHITE fiber washer, measuring .525" diameter. It has a thick metal washer and a snap ring in front of the fiber washer that measures .435" diameter. This leaves about .045" clearance between the fiber washer and the thick steel washer and snap ring. Extended use and wear on the fiber




Figure 3 - Possibility For Shorting

washer can cause the upper switchcontact to short against the steel washer and snap ring

A fourth switch is made identical to the switch in Figure 1, with the exception that it has a BLACK insulator block for the harness screws. The internal fiber washer is RED and made the same as shown in Figure 1. This is a correctly made switch. There are still many of the switches shown in Figures 2 and 3 in the inventory of many parts suppliers. It is suggested that you search for the stoplight switch with the RED or BLACK insulator block for the harness screws for a safe operational switch. The Vintique Inc. switch with the YELLOW insulator for the harness screws is a very good switch after retrofit. You may want to pry the four tabs up, located on the top side of the switch, to open the housing and check for the correct fiber washer (retrofitted with a black fiber washer). We recommend you always install a safety fuse in your Model A electrical circuit (mounted on the Starter) to protect the wiring.

None of these switches can be reasonably modified by the user to fix their inherent deficiencies.

Well done John, well done!






Nate's progress:



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
