

ever seen a dress make out of corduroy. We usually only see that used in jeans or jackets. But as you can see above and to the left, all of these were used for dresses back in the day.

But I'm sure the fabrics were a little different from what we see today. The flannel is described as half wool, fine twilled, and the corduroy is called velvety in texture. The velveteen's are made of rayon and cotton, or mercerized cotton only, or even a combination of rayon and silk. I bet all these wonderful fabrics made beautiful dresses!

Believe it not, I actually find this recipe in a 1930's Children's magazine called "Child Life". The regular column was called "Child Life Kitchen" and was written to help teach the children how to cook. But is sounds yummy and easy to make so it might be good to try after the holidays with any leftover desserts (if that actually happens in your house!). !



Crumple Kisses

Measure 1 cupful of cake or cookie crumbs. (If you have no such crumbs, crackers, specially sweet crackers sweet crackers, will do nicely, but we like cake crumbs the best; no matter how dry, they are all right to use.)

Put them in a shallow pan in a slow oven till they are dry and crisp and slightly brown.

Roll till they are very fine.

Mix the crumbs with 2/3 cupful of sugar and 1/4 cup grated cocoanut. (Finely broken nutmeats are just as tasty, if you prefer them to cocoanut.)

Beat two egg whites till stiff. Gradually fold in the crumb-and-sugar mixture till the whole is well blended.

Drop by small spoonful onto a buttered cookie tin and bake for about 15 minutes in a moderate oven (350°).

Remove from the pan while warm and serve within an hour or two if possible.

Brands We Still Know

The Maytag Washing Machine Company began in 1893. Frederick Maytag, who came to Iowa in a covered wagon as a boy, founded the company with two brothers-in-law and a friend. Originally they produced farm equipment, and in the early 1900's briefly even produced tractors.

Maytag built its first washing machine in 1907 to fill in seasonal declines in farm sales. The first washer had a wooden tub with a hand crank. The first electric model was built in 1911. In 1914 they introduced a multi motor gasoline washer for the rural areas. In 1919 the first aluminum tub was produced.

In 1922, Maytag introduced a revolutionary washing machine with a bottom mounted agitator instead of a lid dolly. With this popular new invention, Maytag began producing wash machines exclusively.

In the 20's and 30's, they also introduced attachments for their washers, including a cream separator, butter churn, meat grinder, and a light generator.

During World War II, the company devoted its facilities solely to the war effort, manufacturing special components for military airplane, including the B-29, B-17, B-26, and the P-51. Production of washers began again in 1946.

Interesting note: Maytag automobiles were produced in Waterloo Iowa from 1919-1915.




Using Carburetor to Check Engine Timing

I found this and other interesting stuff at model-a.org

1. Increase engine speed to twice that of idle RPM by pulling down the throttle lever at the steering column.
2. Gradually open the gas adjusting valve 1/2 to 1 full turn. The engine should start to run richly, and some smoking at the exhaust may occur. This verifies that the fuel passage, regulated by the Gas Adjusting Valve, is open. Turn the GAV clockwise until the engine RPM returns to where it was previously
3. Slowly pull the spark lever down. Engine RPM will increase up to a point. When the maximum RPM is achieved, note this as the position where you will want to place the lever for normal driving purposes.
4. Raise the throttle lever up to the top of its travel. The engine should idle smoothly. With the spark lever still in its "ideal" position for everyday driving, go around the car to the carburetor and ram the accelerator control rod (i.e., from the accelerator linkage) forward. The engine should accelerate to maximum speed within about two seconds if the engine timing is correct. Don't hold the accelerator rod in this forward position for more than a few seconds, because you could damage your engine. If the engine accelerates smoothly and without stumbling, your idle and ignition settings are correct.
5. If acceleration of engine speed is slow or sluggish, ignition timing is probably somewhat retarded. Move the spark rod up to the top of its travel, and adjust the timing. Once the timing has been adjusted, restart the engine, pull down the throttle rod until engine RPM is twice idle RPM, and return to step 3.


MAFFI Newsletter Minute October 2016
