Here's a fascinating article I found at reminisce.com/1930s. It wasn't just the men that drove Model A's and sought out adventure! Letha Smith recounts her story of driving a Model A out west with just her and her friend in 1930!

We roamed west in a Ford Model A

Letha Smith • Highland Park, New Jersey

When my friend Helen and I told everyone that we were “going West” in the summer of 1930, our families were worried and the neighbors were flat-out scandalized. The idea of two girls going off alone like that!

Helen was 18, and I was 24. I'd just put a down payment on a \$600 Ford Model A, and we planned to drive to California to visit Helen's relatives.

On June 13—Friday the 13th—we drove out of Shinglehouse, Pennsylvania, loaded down with a gas stove, folding table, food boxes that were bolted to the running boards, a burlap bag filled with canned goods, and draw curtains for the windows.

What heady excitement we felt, alone on the open road, free to roam the West at will! We were thrilled to fly in the face of convention. We were pioneers! We'd show the folks back home we could take care of ourselves!

Economy was our watchword. All we really had to buy was milk, bread and fruit. Gas was just 8 cents a gallon, and Helen became adept at servicing the car while I fixed most of our meals.

Camping in the Car: We stopped at municipal campgrounds to use the kitchen and showers. When we were ready to sleep, the Ford's divided front seats converted into our “beds.” We stashed the stove and provisions under the car, drew the curtains and locked the doors.



Our adventure was going pretty well until we reached Carroll, Iowa. There, a car shot out from a side street and smashed into the front door, shattering the glass and destroying a food box.

My heart sank. “So ends our adventure,” I thought. “The folks back home were right.” “Not so,” said Helen. “We'll get the car fixed and go on.” We found a repairman named Tony who fixed the door and built a new food box—all for \$30.

We lost our canned foods that day, too. We'd tied the bag to the rear bumper, and the bottom wore through. That night at our campground, we overheard a truck driver chuckling about something odd he'd seen—a trail of smashed canned goods strewn along the road. Helena and I had to laugh, and the next day our spirits soared even higher as we took to the road again.

Sleeping in Splendor: Yellowstone was the high point of our trip. Camping in a grove of trees on the shore of Yellowstone Lake, we slept under four blankets to keep warm. Nonetheless, we had to tear ourselves away from the idyllic spot, where friendly bears roamed and the fish measured up to 18 inches long.

We rolled south to Salt Lake City, Utah and into the desert. Here gas was priced at an exorbitant 12 cents a gallon, and we were forced to take cabins at \$1.50 a night!

On to Lake Tahoe, Truckee Pass and Sacramento. We continued through the world's largest peach and apricot orchards, where we bought giant baskets of fruit for 10 cents.

At Yosemite, we spread our blankets over soft pine needles and slept beneath the giant sequoias and a blanket of stars.

Farther south, in California, Helen's relatives treated us to concerts, picnics, beach parties, museums and a lovely overnight trip to Catalina Island.

On July 30, we began the trip back home to Pennsylvania. It was a cool evening when we reached the Grand Canyon, which surely is the world's most sublime sight. Our second morning there, we were on a mule, heading into the canyon. We had pictures taken of us dangling our feet over the brink of a 1,100-foot drop to the river. “That'll shake up our folks,” Helen said.

After the Grand Canyon, the rest of the trip was pretty tame. We just wanted to get home! On Aug. 17, we drove into Potter County, Pennsylvania. The daring wanderers of the West were welcomed home at last.

Undercover Jewelry

Not all jewelry was created to be shown off! In early days of the 1900's, some jewelry was made to be worn underneath your clothing.

Lingerie clasps were made for a specific purpose—to keep your lingerie from peeking out! Unlike today when teenage girls coordinate the color of their undergarment straps to the color of their tops, it was quite a no-no for a glimpse of these undergarments to be seen in polite company back in the day.

These items were tiny, usually less than an inch long. If you were a girl that had trouble keeping track of your gloves, I bet you despaired over keeping these on hand!

As you can see from the accompanying pictures, these clasps were available in a variety of styles and materials. From 14K gold to mother of pearl, they were still made to be pretty, even if the wearer was the only one supposed to see them!

These lovely little pieces of history are still relatively easy to find today, and a great item to start with for collecting vintage jewelry. Most of the pieces pictured here are currently on sell on Etsy.com or Ebay.com. That is if I don't beat you to them once I finish this article!



Of course most people bought the "gold colored" clips for daily use.



These little clips are mother of pearl and probably came as sets when new.



Of course real gold clasps were available for the wealthy.

This set of clasps was designed to clip to each strap with the middle clip attached to your chemise or slip.



When Pyrex came out, the company made use of free literature to promote it, including this 1931 Booklet: "Pyrex: Getting the Most Out of Foods". Not really recipes, this book assumed you already knew how to cook. It's purpose was to show you how to prepare "entire meals ready in 20, 30, or 45 minutes, baked or served in Pyrex". They sold the idea that cooking this way with all the dishes baked at the same temperature saved energy and money, an important selling point during the depression!

- Baked Slice of Ham with Potatoes (casserole)
- Salsify Fritters (utility dish)
- Baked Tomato and Celery (casserole)
- Cheese and Nut Salad - Sour Cream Dressing
- Hard Rolls - Butter - Pickled Peaches
- Apple Meringue Pie (pie plate) - Coffee - Milk

Cover ham with boiling water. Let stand while cooked potatoes are being sliced. Drain ham and place in greased casserole. Cover with potatoes. Pour hot milk over to nearly cover. Mash cooked salsify. Season with butter, salt, pepper. Shape in small flat cakes and roll in flour. Place in greased utility dish. Dot with butter. Arrange sliced celery and fresh or canned tomatoes in alternate layers in a buttered casserole, adding salt and pepper. Dot the top with bits of butter. Line pie plate with pastry. Fill with thick, well-seasoned apple sauce. Sprinkle sugar over top and add bits of butter. Bake these dishes about 30 minutes in hot oven-400°F. Before serving, pile uncooked meringue or whipped cream over pie and sprinkle with coconut.

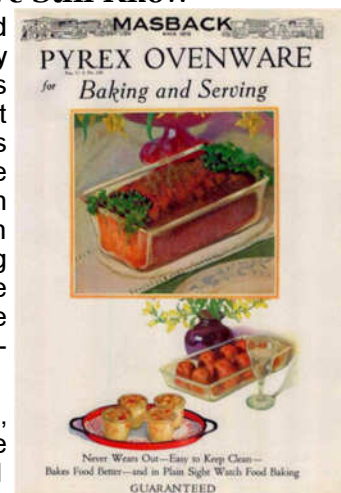


Note: What is salsify?? I had to look it up! "A skinnier relative of the parsnip, salsify is a delicious, versatile winter vegetable. Salsify belongs to the dandelion family and is also known as the 'oyster plant' because of its faintly oystery flavor when cooked Salsify can be boiled, mashed, or fried like a potato, and is a good addition to soups and stews".

Brands We Still Know

Pyrex was developed as a kitchen product by accident. Corning Glass was working at developing a glass railroad lantern globe that would not break in the rain or snow when hot. The resulting product was called "Fire Glass", and was made from a borosilicate low-expansion glass.

In 1913 Bessie Littleton, the wife of one of the Corning scientist asked her husband to bring her something from work to replace a new casserole dish that had quickly broken. He gave her two sawed off battery jars to try. She was amazed by how evenly it baked. Mr. Littleton brought his wife's cake to work and the concept of Pyrex Ovenware was born. Baking in glass was a brand new concept, with food at the time being baked in metal or earthenware dishes. The Pyrex brand debuted their first line of ovenware in 1915. It was an immediate success! By 1927 it was estimated that over 30 million pieces of Pyrex had been sold.

Loura Cook had mentioned to him that she would love to find a Model A mailbox. So Gary was quickly off on



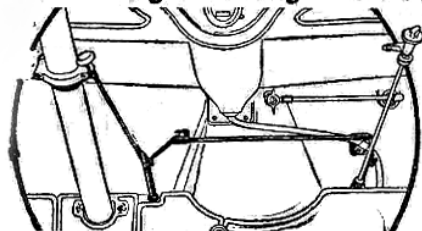
a mission to find the right materials to complete this wish. The hardest item to find were the proper wheels. After some searching, they were located in Arizona!

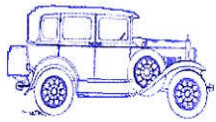
